Who Belongs in the Catechumenate (RCIA):

1. Unbaptized children*: ages 7 - 13 and ...

Unbaptized teenagers: ages 14 - 17 and ...

Unbaptized adults: ages 18 + ... who want to become Catholic.

These Unbaptized children, teenagers and adults are to be fully initiated at the

Easter Vigil Mass receiving all 3 sacraments from a priest.

2. Protestant baptized children*: ages 7 – 13 and ...

Protestant baptized teenagers: ages 14- 17 and ...

Protestant baptized adults: ages 18+... who want to become Catholic.

These Protestant children, teenagers and adults make their profession of faith, receive Confirmation and First Holy Communion, at the same Mass,

anytime of the year from a priest.

3. Catholic baptized teenagers: ages 14 – 17 and....

Catholic baptized adults: ages 18+... who want to make their first Holy Communion and Confirmation. These Catholic teenagers and adults may receive their Confirmation and First Holy Communion, at the same Mass,

anytime during the Easter Season from a priest.

Who does not belong in the Catechumenate (RCIA):

1. **Unbaptized Infants / Children: ages 0 – 6**. These infants/children are to be baptized in the faith of their parents at anytime of the year.

These infants/children do not require any preparation.

2. Catholic baptized children: ages 7 – 13. These children are

to be prepared for their First Holy Communion and Confirmation through a parish sacramental program offered either through a

Religious Education Program or Catholic School.

They first receive First Holy Communion from a Priest and then...

they receive Confirmation from a Bishop.

3. Catholic baptized teenagers: ages 14 – 17 and...

Catholic baptized adults ages 18+... who have already received their First Holy Communion and want to receive Confirmation.

These teenagers and adults are to be prepared for Confirmation through a

Parish or Inter-Parish or Archdiocesan Confirmation Program.

They receive Confirmation from a Bishop.

*Note:

Children participating in the Catechumenate (RCIA), for pastoral reasons, may be enrolled in a parish Religious Education Program or Catholic School at the same time they are preparing to be fully initiated through the Catechumenate (RCIA).
